Mary K. Cobb Collection, 1833-1914

Extent: .5 linear feet (3 folders and 2 scrapbooks)

Biographical note: Born in St. Louis, Missouri in 1865, Mary Kearney Cobb was the only child of Mary Radford (Kearney) Cobb and Daniel Cobb, and a descendant of Daniel Davis. She moved to Barnstable as a young child, and lived in the Davis-Cobb house on Main Street in Barnstable all her life. Her grandparents were Matthew and Mary Davis Cobb on her father's side, and, on her mother's side, General Stephen Watts Kearney (d. 1848) and Ellen Kearney of St. Louis, MO. In the winter months Mary Cobb traveled extensively in Europe and California. She never married. In 1890, Mary Cobb donated the land on which St. Mary's Episcopal Church was built, in memory of her mother. Mary Cobb died in 1948.

Scope and contents note: Bulk of the collection consists of 2 scrapbooks, both about 8 1/2 x 7 x 1 ½" with clippings and handwritten poetry pasted in. Loose items in the scrapbooks include family documents, correspondence, clippings, marriage notices, family obituaries, poems, photographs, and ephemera. Of note are two 1868 letters from Adolphus Davis of Boston to Daniel Cobb of New York regarding the estate of Fred Davis. Collection also includes a series of legal correspondence addressed to Morris Macauley Howard (Mary Cobb's godchild) and probate records regarding the estate of Mary Cobb, and one glass plate negative.
